

6 Ways for You to Prepare Your House for Renovations

MOVE FURNITURE, TOYS, WALL HANGINGS, AREA RUGS, ETC. OUT OF THE WORK AREA

- Most work requires plenty of space to set up ladders, store equipment, cut wood, etc. Giving workers enough space allows them to work more efficiently and avoids any accidental damage to your possessions. We will assist with large or very heavy items upon request.

CLEAR A PATH FROM THE ENTRYWAY TO THE WORK AREA AT LEAST 3FT WIDE

- Construction items are often quite large. Creating enough space ensures safety and efficiency.

VACUUM/CLEAN THE FLOOR OF THE WORK AREA AND ANY WORKER PATHS

- Unless the floor is being removed, floor protection is first thing installed in any worksite. Any dirt left underneath the floor protection may damage the finish of your floors. Also, the floor protection is always taped down to ensure full protection as well as safety. In order for the tape to stick, the floor must be clean and dry.

KEEP CHILDREN AND PETS AWAY FROM WORK AREAS

- Work areas are dirty and dangerous.

DESIGNATE A SINK FOR WORKERS

- A utility sink is ideal. If there is no utility sink, designate a sink with enough room for buckets to be filled and cleaned. A temporary utility sink can be requested for an additional charge.

HIRE A DUMPSTER

- Any demolition work creates a surprising amount of debris. Hire a dumpster at least a day in advance of the work start date. Check with your town to see if a permit is needed.
